

NSIGHT Head Start Body Start Grants

The National Center for Physical Development and Outdoor Play

- AAHPERD: \$12Million grant in 2008 to provide training and support for Head Start and Early Head Start Center to facilitate increased physical activity and healthy eating.
- A significant portion is allocated for grants for Head Start Centers for ≤\$5000 for the creation or improvement of playgrounds or outdoor play
- Partnering with vendors to offer value-added packages of <\$5000 (vendor proposals due 3/23)
- Grant RFPs will be issued annually for the four
- years of the grant period. www.aahperd.org/headstartbodystart
- First grant RFP anticipated May 2009

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KaBOOM! Playspace Opportunities

- KaBOOM!: selects and matches Community and Funding Partners, offers Technical Assistance
- Community Partners: applicant/grantee
 - non-profit; able to generate 65-200 volunteers (15 for planning); able to raise \$10K cash; serve low-income/disadvantaged children; provide 50x50 space; provide food, water, and restrooms for build volunteers: maintain and insure the space
- Funding Partners: could be any organization (Home Depot), provides the money for a substantial portion of the playground

Lowe's Toolbox **Education**

- Previous grant—Lowe's Outdoor Classroom—is now incorporated under this newer program
- Funds a variety of programs, but gives preference to projects with permanent impact such as facilities enhancement, landscaping, and clean-up projects
- Will fund playgrounds as long as the phase to be completed by Lowe's can be finished in one
- Applicant must be a parent group (PTO, PTA, etc.) with 501(c)(3) status that is associated with a non-profit public K-12 school

Allstate Foundation

- · Allstate has funded playgrounds and outdoor play space projects through its Safe and Vital Communities focus area
- National and Local Programs
- Applicants must be non-profit organizations with 501(c)(3) status (see site for applicant restrictions—private schools are among them)
- · Award amounts vary
- · Application information for 2009 is not yet available

- Cartoon Network

Rosie's For All Kids Foundation: **Early Childhood Care and Education Grants**

- Applicants must be 501(c)(3) US organizations that provide licensed, center-based, high-quality, full-day, full-week, year-round childcare and education (not home care) for children birth-6 years old
- >65% low-income
- No grants to individuals, school districts, or municipalities
- Playground Construction is one of four focus areas for these grants
- \$5,000-\$15,000 each for 12 months
- About 30 grants per year

- No deadlines—applications accepted throughout the year



2009 Youth Garden **Grants Program**

- National Gardening Association and The Home Depot
- Applicants must be schools or community organizations promoting: educational focus or curricular/program integration of gardening, nutrition or plant-to-food connections, environmental awareness/education, entrepreneurship, social aspects of gardening
- 2009: 125 grants available:
 - 5 gift cards sets for \$1,000 each (a \$500 gift card to The Home Depot and a \$500 gift card to the Gardening with Kids catalog and store) and educational materials from NGA
 70 \$500 gift cards to The Home Depot and

- Be creative!
- 100 teachers per year receive grants of \$2,000. Three of those are selected to receive additional grants of \$5,000, \$10,000 and \$25,0000.

- Looking for tangible results rather than policy
- Will sometimes support equipment and/or small capital expenses
- Applicant should be near a Finish Line store Most grants are \$1,000-\$5,000

- Judging/Reviewing Criteria: Need, innovation, likelihood of sustainable impact
- Concise!

Physh Ed Grants

- Through the Future Fisherman Foundation
- Grants for teachers to implement fishing and boating safety education programs at public, private, or charter schools
- \$2,500 each
- 300 awards made in six years
- In 2009, Physh Ed accepted applications from both new schools as well as schools with previous grants looking to expand their programs

US Tennis Association Grants

- · Grants for tennis programs
- Non-profits, municipalities, and schools
- \$10,000-\$50,000 each and renewable for up to two years
- Applicant must match USTA's contribution
- 8 grants awarded on Thursday (4/2)— smallest award that round was \$25,000
- Also offer Project/Program Support grants of \$2,500 to \$10,000
- Applications for the 2009 second grant cycle are now open and due 5/15/2009



NSIGHT The Good of the Game Grants

- US Golf Association
- Promoting golf among youth: golf course access and practice range access; golf Instruction; golf equipment, including adaptive golf equipment for individuals with disabilities; transportation provided for participants to attend programming; costs in acceptability accepts for a large state. certain construction costs for alternative, beginner-friendly golf courses and golf facilities in areas where there are obstacles to affordable access to the game

- 150-250 awards per year
- Award sizes vary—average 2008 award works out to \$22,542.
- Grants have previously been reviewed annually in January and May but in 2009 will be reviewed in April and the fall

- Federal grant for improving K-12 PE programs in order to help students meet and/or exceed state PE standards and increase the amount of time they are physically active each
- Eligible applicants: school districts, community-based nonprofits 2009 Deadline: 3/6/2009
- Application is available as an archived reference at: www.ed.gov/programs/whitephysed/app licant.html



PEP

- Awards may be one, two, or three years in length
- Most awards are between \$100,000 and \$500,000 per year, although there is no specific request cap
- Required match of 10% the first year and 25% each of the following years—inkind matches are acceptable





PEP: NSIGHT **What Does it Take to** Win?

- Discussion of your state PE standards throughout the application!!!
- A solid, clear need case
 A solid, comprehensive plan for change
- A strong discussion of the expected impact of your
- Measurable outcomes clearly linked to the problems discussed in the Need statement including GPRA outcomes and baseline data
- Partners and coordination with local, state, and
- federal resources!
 Professional development!!!
- A program design with a basis in research
- A strong evaluation that is ongoing and will result in objective data--both qualitative and quantitative
- A good review panel!***



PEP: **Pitfalls to Avoid**

- · Requesting money for construction
- Requesting money for team sports
- Requesting money for ROTC
- Discussing allowing community members to access equipment purchased with the grant
- Referencing national PE standards
- Disregarding the newest RFP!!!
- Copying other applications!!!
