Our Campus, Our Health: A Model for Media Campaigns

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Introduction

Our Campus, Our Health is a model to engage undergraduate students in basic research methods to implement an annual comprehensive health behavior survey to collect, monitor and disseminate health behavior trends among the campus community.



 The transformational learning opportunity funded project teaches basic research methodology to grow the next generation of health education leaders while offering a valuable resource to the entire campus and community

Model Methodology

- The research team is recruited from the undergraduate Community Health & Health Education program. Applicants are screened by program faculty and formally interviewed for the four research team positions.
- Students serve a one-year term, receive research ethics training, write objectives, assign roles, and develop a timeline for completion.
- The research team uses a 92-item web based health behavior assessment modified from the CDC Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey and based on the six dimensions of wellness



 The IRB approved survey is delivered in the fall semester after pilot testing, cognitive interviewing, and review from a panel of content experts

- After data collection and analysis, the research team delivers an annual State of the Student Health Address to share the findings with students, faculty, administrators, and community stakeholders
- An Executive Summary of findings is provided to campus and local media who attend the State of the Student Health Address



 A video summarizing findings and a series of infographic posters with health behaviors statistics are disseminated throughout campus and posted on the project website.



Health Education Implications

- Our Campus, Our Health fosters interdisciplinary collaboration by engaging students in other majors in dialogue about health behaviors on campus and how individual students can improve their health while inspiring other students to a healthier life.
- The visibility of the Our Campus, Our Health showcases health education as an exciting career choice to undecided underclassmen
- Risky student health behaviors receive much needed attention and student researchers professionally benefit with leadership experience and robust resume enhancement
- Students receive scholarships to present their work at local and national conferences
- The student researchers apply competencies from all Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) responsibilities.
