
#### **Definition of Paraeducator**

- The prefix para-is defined as "at the side of, beside, alongside of".
- A paraeducator, therefore, is a person who works alongside of the teacher, specialist, and administrator in a school.
- May be known as "Teacher Aid, Educational Aid, or Paraprofessional"




## Benefits of the Paraeducator


- An extra set of eyes in the gymnasium

- Discuss your teaching philosophy and approach
- Discuss the paraeducator's duties

- Assist with instruction
  - **1:1**
  - Small group
  - Stations
- Monitor peer tutor program

- Paraeducators can
   gather information on a
   student with a disability
- Assist with IEP goals and objectives
- Resolve conflicts when they arise
- Assist with medical or personal care needs
- Increase socialization
- Other?




# Communicating and Collaboration with Paraeducators

- 2. Establishes rapport with students
- 3. Shows understanding and sensitivity to the student's needs
- 4. Gives clear instructions to the student or group
- 5. Uses appropriate questions
- 6. Uses materials effectively

#### Feedback Checklist



- 7. Reinforces the teaching of the lesson objective
- 8. Keeps lesson focused on goals and objectives
- 9 Keeps students on task
- 10. Gives appropriate feedback to students
- 11. Fosters socialization with peers
- 12. Records students' progress
- 13. Stays on task and uses allotted time effectively




It's all about building rapport through respect, communication and collaboration

## Roles of Peer Tutors






#### Trained Peer tutors

- Characteristics of a good peer tutor?
- Training
  - 2-20 to 30 minute sessions
  - Include the child with the disability when possible
  - Train 2-3 peer tutors per child with disability
